News from head-quarters.

The battle of Cañada Gomez is turning all colors of the rainbow. At first it was a great victory, then a bloodless skirmish as far as our troops were concerned, later we read of it as a surprise, and finally, it appears something very indecisive, as clear as mud. How the Portefes managed to cut 150 throats, without one of their own carotid arteries getting a scratch, is difficult to comprehend.

The detailed account by Flores is amusing for its multiplied technicalities; we fancy we are reading Cesar's commentaries or the campaigns of Napoleon. "Crossing the Carcarafis" is a pretty tableau, worthy to figure beside the pass of the St. Bernard or Hannibal traversing the Rhone. It seems, a flat-bottomed boat and tight rope were the only facilities for making the passage, so that it is not strange the operation lasted from 10 1/2 P. M. of the 21st till 2 A. M. of the 22nd. The right and centre were then marshalled in marching order under one Garcia [unknown to fame]; the left under Sandes and Caraballo. With unusual perspicacity, they sighted the enemy at 2 leagues off, and Sandes was immediately ordered to protect the front with 60 irregulars. As prudence is the best part of valor, this inestimable quality, was enjoined. Caraballo, as orders were given him to advance on the foe. They must have made short work of the middle distance, for, at once, they find themselves only half a league apart, the enemy leaping into the saddle and presenting a force of 12 or 1300 men. Here our cavalry executed a feigned retreat so admirably that a spectator would say they were proficient in such a movement. The enemy then advanced at a charge, but our men, suddenly converted into an adamantine barrier, checked their onset, disconcerting them so much that they turned and fled. In the pursuit, they lost 190 killed, 144 taken prisoners; and left 1750 horses, 143 lances, 14 muskets, 47 carbines, 32 swords, 1 cart, 4 dr. 4 trumpets and a writing-desk. Our loss was only two men with a cut finger.

Fano, before blowing any of the captured trumpets, will ask, how 340 killed and prisoners had, on an average, only one-third of a lance, and one-sixth of a gun each! also how the enemy (unless an unarmed mob) charged and counter-charged without cracking a single Portefes skull? Gen. Laprida, Col. Ruiz and Lieut-Col. (Father) Marin, who have been taken prisoners, will probably advise Flores not to say anything about Pozitos, lest posterity should make an awkward mistake, but truth will compel them to confess that they, at least, have been well treated since captured.

Municipal Decrees

As it is well to know what our rulers are doing, we quote some legislative enactments of our Municipality.

Observance of Sunday

All houses of business shall remain closed on all Sundays and holidays throughout the year, as well by day, as by night, except *padreros* and butchers shops which must be shut from 10 A. M. till 6 P. M. This order

affects the months comprised between Oct. 1st & March 31st. During the other 6 months the excepted shops may open at 4 P. M.

As further exceptions from the above, all apothecaries' shops, coffee-houses, inns, confectionaries, barbers, and tobacconists shops are permitted to remain open all day.

The violation of this ordinance involves a fine of 100 \$ mje.

The Dog-days

The dog-slaying season being about to commence, it is ordered: 1st That all dogs must wear a collar, such as the Police model.

2nd Every dog found without this *vinc que* non shall be despatched, unless his owner pay 50 \$ fine.

Chamber of Representatives

The following has been passed into law.

1 Private property in land or tenements shall pay 3 per thousand on their valuation.

2 Properties not exceeding 40,000 \$ mje in value, when the owners have no other properties, shall be free from taxation.

3 Valuations shall be made in each district (*juzgado*) by a commission for that purpose, so named.

4 Said commissions shall be composed of two officers appointed by Government, and receive 2 1/2 per cent for their services.

5 These commissioners shall hand to each person so assessed a ticket vouching same.

6. In case of appeal on the part of the persons assessed, two arbitrators chosen respectively by such person and the Justice of Peace, shall decide, the Justice having the casting vote.

7. The Justices shall publish this decree in their several districts.

8. After such publication, 60 days grace shall be given, passing which date a fine shall be levied of 20 p \$.

9. This rule applies equally to country districts.

10. Such valuation shall take place before April 1st.

11. The Justices of Peace in the country shall remit the contribution to the *Colecta* in General, deducting 10 p \$ of the amount for their respective Municipalities.

12. The Government may apply the pro-

ceeds of fine for slow payment, to the commissioners as premium.

13. This law shall be annually revised.

NATIONAL BANK.

The following is passed into law:

The Bank shall be authorised to dismiss those officers, whose services are rendered unnecessary by the machines for marking and numbering notes.

GAS & SERENOS.

The municipal tax, for gas, oil *serenos*, weights, measures and beef, is the same for 1862 as it has been this year of grace.

Latest news.

Some vagabond gondoliers have circulated, through our fleet, the report that Col. Caraballo with Flores' vanguard had occupied Santa Fé on the 30th ult., that city being wholly abandoned by the Federal authorities. From fort Melincú we have despatches of Col. Diaz: that officer has captured 46 of the enemy who formerly garrisoned the fort; he has strengthened the advanced picquets of Junin & Lagun Larga, and secured the alliance of the Cacique Coliqueo: the Northern frontier would thus seem safe, the enemy being dispersed in Santa Fé, and eight fugitives from Cañada Gomez taken near Rojas. In the South, also, peace is undisturbed. The Commander of Bahia Blanca writes to say, that, hearing Calfucurá was away from home, he marched with 150 men to Salinas Grandes to burn his house: but finding the Cacique and Cañuil returned, he followed the suggestion of one Lopez an Indian captain, and retired with 2 messengers, of Calfucurá, who is about to send his heir-at-law to congratulate B. Ayres for the unexpected victory of Payon.

LOCAL EVENTS.

Gen. Hornos.—This officer is making a tour of the frontier, which by no means extends, as Potosios say, to the cape of his name.

Sisters of Charity.—The Municipality has resolved on bringing 8 more from France. They will probably come in the same vessel as the new uniforms and Artesian-well machinery.

Custom-House.—In tomorrow's N.º, we will commence to give the despatch of goods, along with such other items as will lead interest to the only foreign daily paper our society can boast of.

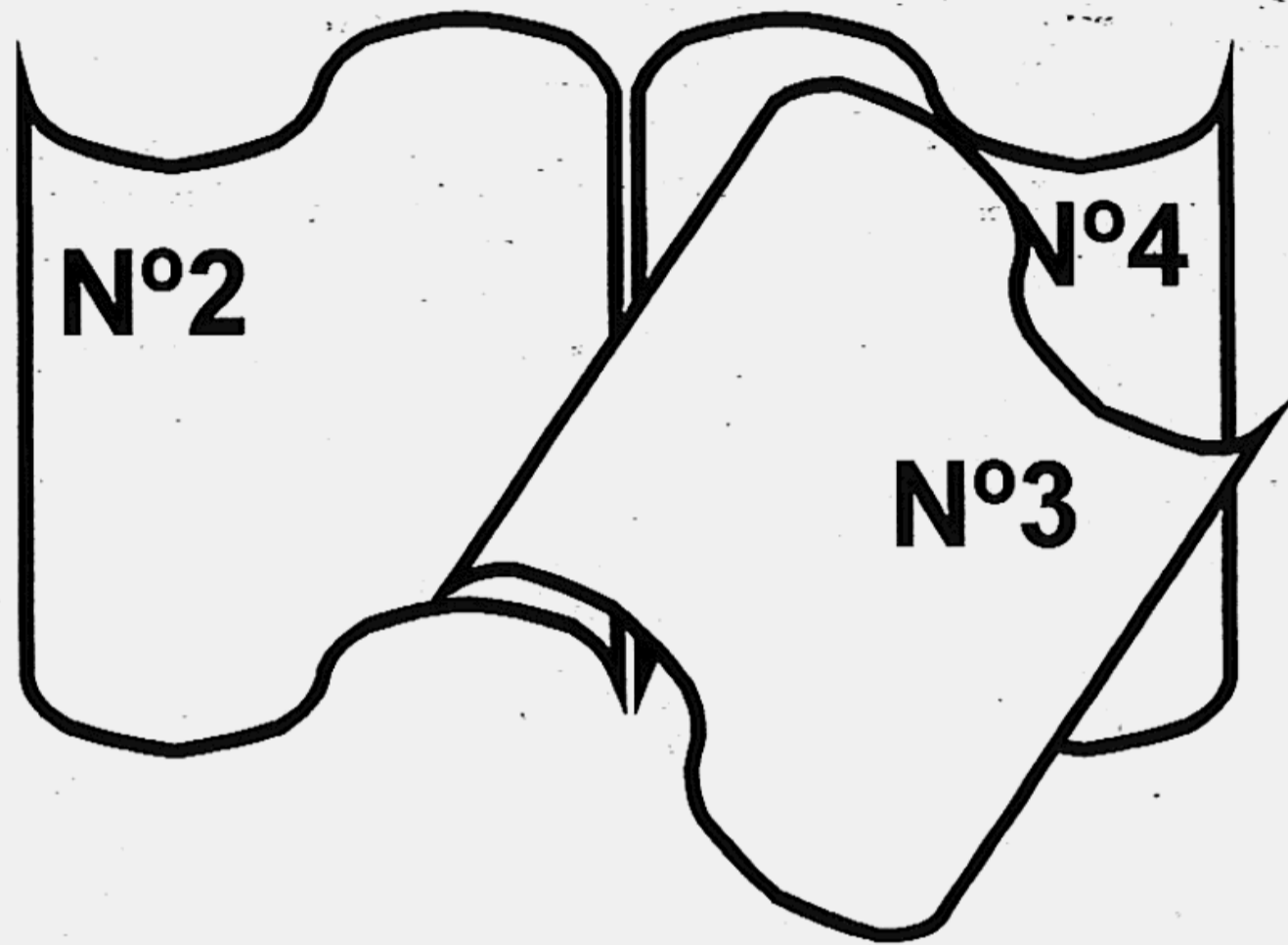
