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SCOTCH CHURCH DISCIPLINE.

Buenos Ayres, 1st Feb. 1861.
To the Editors of the Standard

Dear Sirs,

Yesterday's Standard there appeared another article about the Scotch Church question, written by a Glasgowonian, in which this gentleman accuses the writer of a former communication of drawing conclusions from an hypothesis which it not possible, &c., &c. I would humbly recommend Glasgowonian before again accusing any one of drawing conclusions from a mere hypothesis, to call to remembrance the old adage, that 'those who live in glass houses ought not to throw stones,' he himself asserting that we ought to stick to existing facts *de lazo de las cosas* and before we. For the same reason I suppose we must betake ourselves to our native Gaelic dialect, and clothe our words in simple terms, rather than in those of a philosopher, and especially when the world was two thousand years younger. Such an argument as this is absurd, and if universally carried into practice there would be an end to human progress.

There can be no doubt, however, that tampering with existing institutions and forms merely for a love of change is dangerous and reprehensible, and in matters of religion especially such to be avoided if possible. But in the present case I think the change commendable.

Sometimes, about men, are Tories and Conservatives to the backbone, but to convince, impetuous to reason or argument however logical, where the theme is the passing down of ancient institutions. He must have been a fellow countryman of whom it is related that when his employer, a rich Lancashire cotton spinner, of a philanthropic mind, desired to purchase a new factory, he uttered refusal to avail himself of the means of cleanliness placed at his disposal, and on being summoned before the principal, and told that every one in the mill must make use of them, averred, "My father never washed his feet, nor my grandfather afore him, and I want; it the same."

There is a sentence or two, however, in Glasgowonian's letter to which I would like to call the attention. In one of these Glasgowonian enumerates several specific objections to his connexion with the Church, such as schools, singing classes, &c., and winds up with saying, "So any one can see that it is not composed of men of an extremely well." As if one should enter an hospital, and seeing a patient at the point of death owing to rapid physical decay, should examine him and find that his heart beat low, his lungs that his blood circulated, however slightly, that his limbs performed their functions, however feebly, and as if, judging from the mere manifestations of life, he should pronounce the patient "extremely well." Glasgowonian ought to take into consideration that it is not the number or quality of schemes which a church or community of any kind engages in, but the healthy and vigorous, or languid and feeble manner in which these schemes are carried out, which denotes its vitality or decay of such church or institution. There may be fifty, or there may be five hundred schemes in coin with any community, and yet that community may be fast falling to ruin.

Again, Glasgowonian, in the following paragraph, says that the forms, &c., of the Scotch Church are such that to alter any link of this connected body, might be to destroy its fabric. If the Scotch Church depends on a few outward forms and ceremonies of one particular kind, and if a slight change would be likely to destroy the whole fabric, then, I say, that the sooner such a church comes to an end the better, as on its ruins we may be able to raise another church, which will have some valid principles based on a surer, sadder, and more lasting foundation than a few outward ceremonies.

AMERICA.

Advices received from New York to the 30th Dec. state that Meade, finding few formidable strength in Mexico, had returned to the north side of the Rio Grande. Discussion existed among his generals. From Chittanooga we learn that General Bragg had captured in the course of the Confederate forces by General Hardee. General Grant had apparently recalled his troops from the pursuit of Bragg, and went on to Bermuda. It is said that the Confederates were being reinforced at Dalton by General Joe Johnston. Longstreet was still at Knoxville on the 30th ult. He was repulsed on the 29th in an attack on Fort Sanders. The reported capture of 5,000 of Wheeler's cavalry by Burnside turns out to be incorrect. It is stated that Longstreet had received by the divisions under Bushrod and Johnston, Cumberland Gap dispatches of the 4th inst. that Foster had driven Longstreet's cavalry from the Clinch river, but that the check received by the

Mess. Arco's.

On the sailing of the *Mess. Arco's* from Montevideo, it was rumored that the next victims of the vessel would be Don Jose Brial and Don Adolfo Mansilla.

Receipts for Flores.

On the 29th ult. the *Comodoro Vento Rodriguez* started from Concordia with a reinforcement intended for Flores. On the same date Colonel Longueux resigned his post of Chief of the 1st Regiment, the true reason of this step is unknown, but jealousy is supposed to have occasioned it to do with it, as Servando Gozalez had just had his battalions to meet at the head quarters of the army. From the Government troops desertions are daily taking place, and the army in general is in a state of demoralization. Flores is every day becoming stronger.

Shipwreck.

On Wednesday evening, about six o'clock, p.m., a vessel was seen coming full speed up the river; what opposite the Mole, she was caught on an extra-stroke roller, and having lost her hold, she broke in two, hurrying the captain, first and second mates, and all the crew, into the angry flood. Part of the crew, when in the front of the ship, went down, but the rest remained manfully by his capsize boat, and taking the care in one hand, and a painter in the other, coolly walked on shore, towing the vessel, as Galviera did in the Liptonian fleet. The cargo, which consisted of half a pumpkin, a small quantity of cotton, and a plug of tobacco, was totally lost. We have not heard if it was insured. The crew was all saved.

Workmen are busily employed in placing the machinery on board the steam-ship at present building at Baracas. When finished she is intended to run between Fray Bentos and Guayaquil.
