NO TESTIMONY

Mutiny of Flores's army

We have received Flores's Report. Medico Moreno started on the 17th for headquarters, taking a number of youths in his staff. Colonel Launza arrived same day. Gen. Luna was to take his seat in the Way office on the 18th. Servando Gomez writes from Valencia 14th inst. that Flores forced the Polanco pass at Rio Negro on the day before, going towards Tacuarembó in a state of demoralization.

NEWS FROM THE PROVINCES

We have no dates from San Juan, Rioja, or Catamarca. The province of Jujuy was quiet, and Governor Araoz going on well. On the 23rd of February, the election for Governor took place at Tucuman. Of 35 Deputies, 34 voted for Nor. Passo, whose elevation to power is a popular triumph. On same day D. Jose Polanco, was elected senator to Congress in town of D. Vega appointed Federal Judge. Terrific rains fell on the 23rd for seven hours, swelling up the rivers, but luckily no harm was done. In Cordoba things became quiet again, after the defeat of Odoñez, who rebels were expelled. The rest clearing out, Colonel 'Bizarro,' with his regiment, was at Villa Rosario. The 'Eco' upholds the idea of a Rosario Exhibition.

CHILLI

We have dates from Santiago up to 12th Feb, and from Valparaiso and Serena till the 12th Feb. In Valparaiso there had been another large fire, the principal sufferer being Don Joaquin Humboldt, whose splendid house was burned to the ground. Luckily for Valparaiso the companies of firemen are so well organized and drilled that fires cannot now reach the same extent as they did in former times.

HOLY WEEK.

The Chief of Police has published the following decree:— 'During divine service in the churches no one shall be allowed to wear hats, or to use umbrellas, or on the pavements, in front of the churches; if on being told to move or to remove, he shall be arrested and punished. No carts, carriages, or horses shall be allowed to pass along the streets from ten a.m. of Thursday next until the close of the Holy Saturday next. During the same time all commercial houses, shops, and establishments of industry, with the exception of book-binders, printers, and cigar-makers, must be closed. It is also requested that house holders sweep the streets in front of their houses on Holy Thursday at eight a.m., so that the filth may be removed before ten o'clock a.m. All scaffolding and rubbish must be removed from before a house on Saturday.
