EDITOR'S TABLE.

The list number of the 'Nacionalista' appeared yesterday, from the office: the editors cast on a large circulation, taking 20,000 copies. The motto of the paper is 'Go ahead!' The politics are apparently sane as this paper—'peace and national progress, and the abolition of 14 Governors and pigmy administrators.'

We are glad to learn, from several sources, that there are no longer any serious fears of a drought during winter, and the Irishmen of Veredes and Lujan have all returned, with their flocks from the frontier camps.

GREAT STORM IN THE CAMP.

All accounts agree in representing the late storm as one of the most terrible which has visited our campaign for several years. Its ravages have been more general in Mercedes and Lujan than elsewhere, surpassing the famous gale of April 30th, 1862. Several houses have been blown down, roofs carried off, and 'collars' torn

up, but happily no greater calamity has occurred than the mixture of some flocks of sheep. A native estancia, near Lujan, had his fine roof carried a considerable distance from his house, and Mr. David Olavin (who is an Irish estancia), and perhaps the only one to a subscriber to the 'Standard' had the misfortune to see his single roof lifted up and deposited on a neighbour's land. Near La Chona, several wells overflowed, from the torrens of rain, and those who had no ditches to carry off the water were inundated. A number of trees were blown down, but the houses sheltered by 'montes' generally escaped serious injury. In one place a man imprudently left his door open, and all the plaster was torn off the walls; others had their sheep-pens levelled, and the flocks driven before the wind.

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INDIANS.

The 'Constitutional' of Mendoza says that the Comandante don Carlos Rafael publishes the following despatch addressed to the Colonel-in-chief of the Frontier:—

I have to advise you that the Indians who came to rob us far as the Corral de la Llave, 15 leagues to the east of this place, situated upon the Rio Nuevo, I pursued with two light companies of soldiers and some National Guards. I completely routed and captured away from them 300 head of cattle and some horses, which they had stolen from the haciendas of Arenas and other villages on the banks.

can be shared but appealing to the people, when events, such as has happened, interrupt all public order? The revolution which I have headed does not desire the proscription of any one, it only wishes free voting;—it wishes all rights to be guaranteed; and should the wish of the people be against this, then it would give way to public opinion.

'The resistance of the false legalists can mean nothing else, and if it did not, it deserved to be overthrown by their own pariahs. The band of pariahs and hatched have severed their ties with their country to the luxury of vengeance. Consequently the lofty principles proclaimed by me after the victories of Cepalinas and Vera, and which placed me at the head of this revolution, represent my banner to-day, to which should flock all who wish no more war, no more ruin, no more usurpation, and who desire to see at the head of public affairs order and loyalty.'

'But unfortunately the voice of Reason has not listened to me, but if Reason were more attended to, then shall I see myself under the necessity of prosecuting the war with double vigour. We have no other pretext for war but the defence of our country, and he, who seizes this, does not join our standard, has no love for his country, and only desires a continuation of the present state, established by the struggle in the hope of our satisfying a desire, however remote or barren in its results.'

'These are the principles of the revolution, and have I claim to be believed, after a serial of one year not one single proscription has been broken.'

EXPENSE AND EXPENDITURE OF THE FLORES' EXPEDITION.

A return was published on Thursday of the great public account established by the return for the year ended the 30th of September last, and also for the year ended the 31st day of December in the same year, together with an account of the balances in the account at the commencement and at the termination of the year, and the amount of funded and unfunded debt created or redeemed in the said year.

The account of the year ended the 31st day of December, 1863, was £70,153,820 5s. 6d. The total ordinary expenditure of the same year was £20,010,977 11s. 6d. To this ordinary expenditure was to be added the sum of £200,000 for expenses of fortifications provided for by money raised by No. 23 and 24 of the Act of the Government of Don Bernardo Berro: 11s. 10d. The excess of income on ordinary expenditure were thus £52,842,842 13s. 11d.; and when from this sum the amount of £200,000 for expenses of fortifications, the net surplus was £2,642,842 13s. 11d. This result will be received as very satisfactory, and as justifying a large and considerable reduction of taxation in the present session.
