THE PROVINCIAL GOVERNMENTS

There is a sort of thin coat of varnish over the present state of things, which makes people believe at first sight that the confederate system of governing this republic is the very perfection of legislation.

There is not a more patched up and cobbled system of governing one million and a quarter of human beings than the Argentine Federal system. We doubt if the inventive genius of man could fabricate a Government more calculated to create revolution, disturbance and anarchy, than the one we have.

But for an article which appeared in yesterday morning's 'Tribuna,' we should not have troubled our readers with this tedious political question, but our colleague bemoans the condition of Buenos Ayres, and as proof of the injustice done this province, states that Salta and Jujuy have their own legislatures, their own provincial chambers, free, enlightened and independent, yet Buenos Ayres has none.

Of course this article entitled the 'Death of Buenos Ayres' is calculated to create a rather serious sensation amongst all superficial thinkers, who will naturally believe that Buenos Ayres is victimized, but to our mind the greatest benefit which could accrue to this country would be the death of all our petty Provincial Governments.

Any man who knows anything at all about the River Plate, must admit that these Provincial Governments have had a fair trial, and have proved a miserable failure. We hope therefore that the 'Tribuna' is right, that the Provincial Government of Buenos Ayres is dead, that Santa Fe, Cordoba, Entre Rios, and all the other Provincial Governments will meet a like fate, and that in the Argentine Republic, power will be concentrated in one man, and that man President Mitre.

The country is at present torn and convulsed by hundreds of political parties or cliques; there is not a province in the country which is not infested with them.

It is absurd to say that the republic is divided into two great parties, the Federal, and Unitario, since in every province these parties bear a different tint. The political cliques or parties in this republic are now nearly as numerous as those of the United States before the war. The Unitario of Buenos Ayres is of the Voltairian school, and the very essence of a free thinker. In Corrientes he is a red republican, in Entre Rios he is a Mazzini, in Santa Fe he is a sound radical reformer, in Cordoba he is a despot, in Tucuman he is a Mormon, in Mendoza a well-dressed gentleman, in Santiago del Estero a visionary, in San Juan a speculator, in Jujuy an educated pauper, in Salta a Montenero; whilst on the contrary, the Federal in Buenos Ayres is either an old fogey or a gaucho, in Corrientes he is the man of property, in Entre Rios the lover of peace and order at any cost, in Santa Fe the adherer to old customs and habits, in Cordoba the peaceable and quiet citizen, in Tucuman the illiterate land owner, in Mendoza the chiripa aristocrat, in Santiago del Estero the sound practical man, in San Juan the revolutionist, in Jujuy the wealthy planter, in Salta the respecter of the laws and the majesty of the Government.

President Mitre is called to rule over a country composed of such a heterogeneous mass of politicians, he is obliged 'ex-officio' to please everybody, and if he fails in this he is worse than Boss. In Buenos Ayres the President is regarded by his political opponents as a despot, a Federalist, a sworn enemy of the province.

In Entre Rios he is a cowardly Portefo, in Corrientes he is looked on as a sort of slave trader who seeks to carry off the free and enlightened Correntinos into slavery and bondage. In San Juan he is thought to be a first rate school-master. In the rest of the provinces nobody knows anything about him, and his Government is only known as the Portefo administration.

We have 14 different Governments all embodied in one; each of these 14 Governments is pulling in different ways, until at last the unfortunate National Government, which should be the strongest in the country, can only be regarded as a sort of fool in the middle, disoriented and undone.

Let it not be supposed for one instant that we wish to throw ridicule upon President Mitre - far from it; but since there is still left liberty of the press, let us candidly and courageously speak out the truth: the present system of Government is a dream, a vision, an illusion. The present system of governing this republic is unsafe and ill adapted for the customs, wants, and passions of the people; the sooner Congress remodels the Constitution and sweeps away all the petty Governments of the provinces, the better for the country at large, and for General Mitre its President.

The New Steam-boat Lines of Messrs. Harrison & Mansilla. The new steam-boat contract between the Government and Messrs. Harrison and Mansilla is about to be presented to Congress: it is one of the most important enterprises ever undertaken in this country.

Messrs. Harrison and Mansilla agree to establish six lines of steamers from this port.

One between Buenos Ayres and Montevideo.

One between Buenos Ayres and Rosario, touching at intermediate ports.

One between Buenos Ayres and Gualeguay, in connection with the Rosario line.

One between Rosario and Corrientes, touching at intermediate ports.

One between Buenos Ayres and Concordia, touching at intermediate ports.

One between Buenos Ayres and Bahia Blanca.

The steamers on these lines shall make their trips as follows:—

Three round trips a week on each of the following lines—Montevideo, Rosario, and Concordia.

Four round trips per month on the Corrientes and Gualeguay line.

One round trip every twenty days on the Bahia Blanca line.

All these lines shall be established within eighteen months after the approval of Congress, with the exception of the Bahia Blanca line, which shall be started in eight months after approval.

The contract to last for five years, and the fares and freight to be reduced 20 per cent. from the present tariff; emigrants only to pay half price.

The steamers shall be constructed expressly for the purpose, and shall be the finest that ever entered the River Plate. Mails to be carried free, and Government to be at liberty to send four passengers and two tons of cargo free each trip.

Such are the terms of the proposed contract, which we understand only awaits the sanction of Congress to be at once carried out. Sr. Mansilla, who is the principal proprietor of the Argentine diligences which carry the mails through the interior, is the party associated with Captain Harrison in this enterprise. These proposed lines of steamers will, therefore, be in combination with Sr. Mansilla's line of coaches, which cannot but be regarded as a double advantage, as parties can be booked in the most distant province through to Buenos Ayres, Montevideo, or Bahia Blanca.

We understand that the Minister has already sanctioned the proposed contract, and that it only now requires the sanction of Congress.

EDITOR'S TABLE.

Veritas, versus Santa Maria, is the great suit pending in town at present. Every one is asking who Veritas is, and what answer Sr. Santa Maria will make to the letter published in yesterday's 'Standard.' Town is rife with all sorts of rumours respecting our Consuls in London. The on dit yesterday was, that M. Elizalde had stated both Mr. Sampson and Mr. Fair must be removed. The 'Ferro-Carril' of Rosario, contains some rather serious charges against Mr. John Fair respecting the same matter, and calls upon the Government to at once remove him from the post of Consul.

On Monday, at one o'clock, the Secretary of the Bank will burn four millions of paper money. The public are invited to attend. We hope some of our friends will go to the Bank to see that the money is properly counted. We have received another communication from a friend of Mr. Wheel-

wright, in answer to Sr. Santa Maria's letter, but as the Veritas' reply embraces all the points raised, we have thought it unnecessary to publish it.

There seems to be a regular set on the doctors, by the rowdies of Buenos Ayres. One of our most distinguished physicians, called yesterday to visit a lady patient, and whilst feeling her pulse, she caught sight of a revolver in his breast pocket, which nearly made her faint. It appears that the medical men all carry revolvers now, and under no circumstances will attend a call in the middle of the night, unless supplied with a body guard.

The news from the camp districts, respecting the grass, is good. Many of our countrymen are in town at present, and they assure us that the prospects of the farmers for the year never were better. Sheep, however, in consequence of the alarming increase of crime in the camp, have fallen in value. No one seems anxious to invest in sheepfarming, until some reforms are introduced for the better protection of life and property. Robberies are everywhere on the increase, and murders also. If instead of a Governor, with Ministers, &c., we had one good man as commandant over the whole camp, who, when a crime was committed, would scour the whole country to find the culprit. What a beneficial change it would be. Property of every description would increase in value, and fresh capital every day find its way to our partides: the present mockery of justice in the camp is the ruin of the country. As an instance of the great difficulty in realising property in the camp, we may remark that a flock of superior mestiza sheep were sold in the partido of Pilar, at 45 dols., on two years' credit, without interest. This is a sign of the times!

The first set of traction engines is expected to arrive per next Liverpool steamer. We may soon look for the practical working of this great problem, second in importance only to the Grand Central Railway. In a Sheffield paper we read an interesting account of several experiments of Boydell's Endless Railways.

General Taboada of Santiago is most anxious to form an English colony in his province. He offers an estate in shares to any intelligent Englishman who will manage same, and further more land, seed, cattle &c. in all well-conducted foreigners settling down there. Mr. Kensing, 140 calle Parque will give full particulars.

Consul Hutchings is accused of stating that land could be had at in the interior at 30 shilling per sq. league (3,500 acres). This is so absurd an idea that we take on ourselves to acquit our friend and countryman of the charge. It would be difficult to find land even at 20 times that figure.

There is a magnificent tract of 11 sq. leagues for sale, at the Rincon de Soto, the finest situation on the Correntine coast of the Parana. We learn that Del Sar's salarico in this neighborhood is about to resume operations under a new manager.

Bad news for Cotton: all the Parana plantations have failed, in most part. We are however happy to hear of a second joint stock cotton society being formed in Corrientes.

Cap. Harrison has returned from Higueritas after inspecting the locality for his coal depot. We believe he departs for Europe by next packet.

The Una, Liverpool steamer, left this port for England, via Montevideo, last evening, with a full cargo and large number of passengers.

The French mail leaves on Thursday 12th inst. and we may expect the Mercury to arrive next day or Saturday.

On dit: one of the interesting 'cuentos de'ores' yet entered on B. Ayres calendars will, come before the courts. It is much talked of, both parties being Englishmen; the plaintiff a Civil Engineer and the Defendant a distinguished ship-broker.

We have been favored with vol. VI. of the Postal Report for the Republic. It is very interesting, except in the item shewing that the Post-service causes a loss to the Exchequer. We will review it in our next.

The Provincial Chamber has not accepted the resignations of the Codigo Senators, but declared their seats vacant. This is a distinction without a difference.

Three or four Congress members arrived yesterday: it is thought the solemn inauguration of the National Chambers will take place on to-morrow or Tuesday.

It is rumored that Sr. Caxon is about to resign his post as Chief of Police, and will be succeeded by Colonel Diaz.

The Irishmen of Leones, Villa Mercedes, are about to build a church on Mr. John Dillon's estancia, having already obtained leave from the Bishop, and the money not being wanting.

The 'Pueblo' states that a Cabinet meeting took place on Friday at the Provincial Government House, to appoint a successor to Dr. Acosta. Sr. Tejedor was mentioned, but rejected by a majority of Crudo politicians, and the choice fell on D. Adolfo Alaina. The opera of Hernani will be given to-night at Colon.

PORTUGUESE ITEMS

There was great excitement caused in Lisbon on the night of the 17th March, by the arrival in the Tagus of the Austrian gunboat Seebund, and the Austrian frigate Schwanberg, with the Danish brig Gerthe, which they had captured on her voyage from Leith to Barcelona.

The capture was made on the 16th, at 2 p.m., in lat. 38 deg. 40 sec. N., and 8 deg 10 sec. W. long., from the Cape of Santa Maria. According to the statement of the captain of the brig, the commander of the frigate declaring his ignorance of the latitude in which the prize was taken.

This affair has caused much discussion, as the public opinion is that the vessel was taken in Portuguese waters. Already diplomatic notes have passed between the Austrian and Danish Ministers and the Portuguese Government. According to the Portuguese laws, the captor and captured are not allowed to remain in Portuguese ports, and the Minister for Foreign Affairs has notified this to the Austrian Minister. The brig Gerthe has accordingly left the Tagus in charge of an Austrian officer and a prize crew. The master, mate, and crew of the brig are also on board of her.

Well done, Austria! A gunboat and a frigate capturing a small brig, and then their being assisted into Lisbon (as the men of war, according to their own statement, were like the Canadian fisherman, Jerry Bogaud, at sea, but did not know where), is a feather in your cap, as a naval power!

The Portuguese Government are publishing an interesting table of all the shipwrecks which have taken place on their coasts, and those adjacent, during the year 1863. There have been 25 shipwrecks, of these 12 were Portuguese, 2 French, 1 Russian, 1 British, 1 Italian, 1 Austrian, 1 Spaniard, 2 Hamburg, and 1 Dutch. All the crews were saved, and the only loss of life was that of 6 passengers by the barque San Bernardo.

Under the name of the Lisbon Oil Mills Company, limited, a new company has been started in London, for the purpose of manufacturing, on a large scale, linned oil. The capital is £100,000, in 10,000 shares of £10 each. The bankers in Lisbon are the London and Brazilian Bank.

A proposition has been made to the Government, by some London capitalists, to construct a railway from Lisbon to Mapa, passing by Campa-Grande, Bemica Luz, and Cintra.

A terrible disaster took place at Vianna de Castello, lately. The Opero well dilgruice, in passing along a bridge, fell into the river. The coachman and one passenger were saved. The passengers inside were carried away by the force of the current; three of them and four horses were drowned. - Diario de Rio de Janeiro.

NEWS FROM THE MINES

SHARES ALL BOUGHT UP

Notwithstanding that we take the greatest possible interest in the San Juan Mining Company, we very seldom receive authentic information from Mr. Rickard. Yesterday, a shareholder in this company favoured us with a letter which he received from San Juan, under date the 21st April.

The shareholders of the San Juan Mining Company have accepted the proposal of Major Rickard to buy up all the shares at par. His object is to form a large English company with a capital of £200,000. He is willing to let the Buenos Ayres shareholders join, but they must pay up the call due, and agree to his plan, which is really an excellent one, and the only one feasible: by this arrangement, a heap of money will be made.

ENTRE RIOS.

Now Governor Installed.

On Sunday 1st. inst. Governor Urquiza resigned the reins of power into the hands of D. Jose M. Dominguez. The new Governor placed his hand on the Holy Gospels and took the usual oaths, after which he made a brilliant speech from which we extract as follows.

"I cannot express the sentiments which fill my breast, on being called to succeed the illustrious man whose fame has filled the entire Republic, whose sword has overturned the despotism of twenty years, whose genius has created a free nation, and whose kindness has caused him to be regarded as the 'Father of his people.' Fidelity to the Constitution and loyalty to the Republic, is my programme."

Gen. Urquiza said "I joyfully resign the authority into your hands, for in you, I recognize not only the elect of the people, but moreover an upright citizen, steady friend and distinguished statesman. Take the reins of Government with confidence, and count upon the aid of the Entre Rian people and upon mine."

After several other speeches, the artillery fired a salute in the Plaza Ramirez in honor of the new Governor,

and the officials and citizens went to sing a solemn Te Deum in the church. The troops were passed in review after the ceremony, and then the cortege proceeded to the Government house where a splendid repast was laid out. At the same time the Director and students of the Concepcion college presented a flattering address to Gen. Urquiza, and the day was a festivity to among the citizens of Concepcion.

Governor Dominguez has formed his Cabinet of Drs. Nicanor Molinas, and Jose J. Sagastume, both of whom have accepted the dignity of Minister. The new regime seems to give general satisfaction, and the vexed question of Gen. Urquiza's successor has passed off without difficulty, and even with *celos*. The harmony ensured between Gen. Urquiza and the Governments of his province and of the Republic will have a good effect in checking the spirit of disorder which was casting its roots so widely, thanks to the turbulent editors, both in Parana and Buenos Ayres.

STATUE TO GEN. URQUIZA.

The Legislatura of Entre Rios has decreed as follows:

1. His Excellency Captain General Justo Jose Urquiza, first constitutional Governor of this province, has deserved well of his country and is entitled to public thanks.

2. All the Provincial authorities, in their official documents shall treat him, during his life, with the title of "Excellency."

3. The Executive shall erect in the new plaza a column surmounted with the statue of Gen. Urquiza.

4. At the foot of the statue shall be engraved "Discite a me virtutem, heli-que (?) laborem;" and on the pedestal a text of the present law.

5. After the inauguration of the statue, the plaza will be called after General Urquiza.

6. A committee of the Provincial Assembly shall present to General Urquiza a copy of the present law. Concepcion. May 1st 1864.

CORRIENTES.

We have received the Progreso to the 1st inst. Mr. Zinny had concluded the examinations of the Colegio Argentino. The Chamber was occupied with the reformation of the Constitution. General Caeceres arrived on the 30th ult. D. Manuel V. Fernandez has been named to the Directory of the State Bank. The steamer Gran Chaco arrived from Rio Vermejo, 25th ult. having been 20 days on the voyage from Rivadavia colony: her cargo is tanned hides, and she met with several accidents coming down the river. She was to leave Corrientes for B Ayres on the 21st April. D. Serafin Gibson, of Goya, an Anglo Argentine Nat. Guard refused to attend parade at the church festivals of Holy Week: he was, therefore, ordered under arrest for 8 days, but this was afterwards commuted to 24 hours. The Progreso brings no news of cotton, the editor filling up a large portion of his columns with apophthegms and proverbs about love and women. Paper currency 238 per doubloon.

ANOTHER PRIVATE BANK

We understand that the National Government has received proposals from an influential foreigner, for the purpose of establishing a new private bank.

At present the matter is kept a great secret in the Government-house, but, unusual, this secret has found its way to the 'Standard' office. We give it to our subscribers.

We understand, that the capital of the proposed bank is no less than two millions sterling, which will be invested mainly in public lands in this and the other provinces.

The Government, very properly regards the matter with a kind eye, it will be brought before Congress immediately.

We hear that the prospectus of the new bank speaks, in the most flattering terms, of the immense business done by the London and River Plate Bank.

BRAZILIAN ITEMS.

Minas Geraes. Dates have arrived from Minas Geraes, and we extract the following news from the paper.

In the place called Varzea Alegre, district of the Villa da Ponte Nova, on the 5th March, Antonio Gomez da Silva Timoco was murdered by a slave of his, called Jose, who stabbed his master with a knife above the heart. The assassin also attacked another slave and wounded him. He was pursued by the other slaves and captured and handed over to the police.

On the 19th March, at Ponta, half a league from the village of Piranga, Jose Ignacio Mutins, attacked Claudio Joaquin de Oliveira who received 15 slugs in his left leg, and was also wounded with a knife. The assassin was captured.

On the 6th March last at 11 a.m. Antonio Alves da Rocha, commonly called, Barboletta committed suicide.

At the moment of committing this act of madness, and when he had armed himself with an axe, he called his wife and asked her to embrace him as he was going to die. The poor woman wishing to turn aside the blow threw herself upon him, and received a slight wound. The unfortunate man had also a small pistol, with which he destroyed himself a few minutes afterwards. - Diario do Rio de Janeiro.

IMPORTANT.

The Pueblo gives the following extract from the Expan.

"A letter from Montevideo, from a respectable foreigner (a Tribune foreigner?) who is well posted up in public affairs, asserts that the Brazilian Intervention meets with the approval of England, and that the occupation of the Oriental territory, instead of being temporary, will be perpetual."

Should such be the case, it would be the very best thing that could happen to the country, for the remark made by Steele, the friend of the great Liberator with respect to another country, quite suits the Oriental republic.

Steele was wont to say Barataria is the finest country in the world, but it has one drawback. The judges are rogues, the jury are rogues, and the people are villains. If Brazil really annex the Oriental republic, some good may get be expected from that unhappy country, and in his next speech M. Thiers will be obliged to except Uruguay from the backward states of South America.

ONE STEAMER MORE.

We shall soon have another steamer on the station of Uruguay and Montevideo, the new British steamer 'Fairy,' The following particulars of which have been forwarded to us by her agent, Mr. Henry Dowse:

"The beautiful British steamer will soon be placed on the Uruguay station, touching at this port, on her trips out and in. At present there are on board 30 to 40 men on board of her, putting her to rights; and we understand that the Acting Agent will be Henry Dowse, Calle Cuyo No. 1."

The following particulars and her size and capabilities are taken from the 'Pais' of Montevideo:—

"The Fairy—Yesterday morning, this British steamer started on a pleasure and trial trip; she reached in one hour the Isla de Flores, which is generally considered about five leagues distant. This steamer will soon be placed on the station of the Uruguay, calling at the different ports on the coast, thus affording new facilities to the commercial public. With respect to her capabilities, she has only been sailing for six months, and her usual speed is from 13 to 14 knots an hour. She is 136 feet in length, 35 feet in breadth, 7 feet depth of hold draws 4 feet draught of water, she has 2 saloons for ladies, 1 do. for men, 1 large saloon, 1 fore cabin. Her hurricane deck is 40 feet long and 10 feet broad, with a splendid awning. She has a magnificent service of plate, a machine for making ice, and a piano.—Nacion Argentina."

Sr. PINILLA

The Gefe Politico of Paysandu

A Prussian periodical, 'The New Evangelic Gazette,' published in Berlin, speaks in very glowing terms of Sr. Pinilla, the Gefe Politico of the Department of Paysandu. Amongst other things, that newspaper says:—

"This gentleman, Sr. Pinilla, merits our most sincere sympathies and thanks for his kind and gentlemanly conduct towards the Protestant inhabitants of that privileged district which is under his charge. It is owing to him that the first steps have been taken for the formation of a Protestant cemetery, he having given the land for that purpose, besides a donation of 200 silver dols. It is solely owing to his paternal care and anxiety for the welfare, that the European emigrants in Paysandu find themselves so comfortably and safely settled."

LATEST FROM GUALEGUAYCHU

To the Editors of the 'Standard.'

Gentlemen, I am after making a tour through Entre Rios, and I have found the camps in all parts where I have been in a magnificent state - most beautiful pasture; cattle, horses, and sheep are rolling in fat—quite as fat as I have ever seen them in Buenos Ayres in the months of November or December.

This town is all astir to day, in consequence of the long wished for steamer Era. From an early hour this morning they have been decorating the banks of the river Gualeguay, for several squares, with flags, &c. The band is also awaiting her arrival. I will be present at the grand function, and will send you an account, as near as I can, of the proceedings.
