POST-OFFICE RETURNS 1860.

There is no more infallible index of the progress of a country than its post-office returns; for, in the present day, letters and newspapers are synonymous with commerce, education, and prosperity.

Since 1859 the letters and newspapers received in B. Ayres have more than doubled whilst those despatched have increased ninefold.

In 1859 the total number of letters passing through the post of B. Ayres was 226,512, and in 1860 this increased to 803,185.

The postal returns of B. Ayres may be almost taken for those of the whole Argentine Republic, the former being more than two thirds of the sum of the 14 provinces.

The revenues of the Post-office are not yet sufficient to meet its expenses but it is likely that before long this department will even prove a lucrative branch of the exchequer.
