SAN JUAN SILVER MINES.

The latest accounts from San Juan are very encouraging. Messrs Klappenberg of Buenos Ayres on arriving at Hilario, last month, entered into some mining speculations which promised to turn out most successful. We learn on reliable authority that the reported attack by the miners on the new machinery was a mere fabrication: a portion of it has been already set up in working order at Hilario, the rest remains in the company's stores at San Juan. The road between these two places crosses a wild and precipitous mountain range, and recent visitors say that it is impossible to imagine the difficulties Major Rickard must have encountered in transporting his material over those rugged routes in which the mules can hardly find a footing. In many places are to be seen the remains of waggons and machinery which some adventurous miners attempted, many years ago, to carry up to the heart of the argentiferous region.

Mr. Rickard has so far fully succeeded in his efforts, and calculates on having all the works completed by the close of the present year. But the shareholders have miserably checked his operations, and almost caused the ruin of the enterprise; those in Buenos Ayres have not paid the third call, and the secretary has been obliged to publish a notice in the city threatening to make forfeit all those who failed to comply. In this emergency the San Juan shareholders found themselves unable to meet, unaided, the heavy expenses of getting up the works and purchasing silver ores, the local funds being almost exhausted. The liabilities were \$8000 Bolivian (£1,500 sterling) and the available sum only \$3,000. Nothing remained but to sell out the shares, if possible, or declare the company bankrupt. The former proceeding, if at all practicable, must involve a terrific loss; the latter would of course destroy an enterprise on which not only the hopes of the shareholders, but of the whole nation were dependent, as also the fame of our talented countryman who may be considered the soul of the undertaking.

Major Rickard manfully stepped forward to the rescue, and offered to lend thirty thousand dollars to save the credit of the Co. His lawyer, however, advised him rather to buy up the shares held in that province. At such a time he might have profited of the declaration of the Directors "that the Co. could not fulfil the ends for which it was established, from want of funds," he might have taken up the shares (virtually insolvent) at half their value but he purchased them at par, although shares had been sold in B. Ayres at 10 and even 20 per cent discount. In this step his object was plainly to prevent a loss to the originators of the Co., and to possess himself of such a majority of shares as to place the whole enterprise in his own hands so that according to the Código de Comercio he might dissolve the Co. and form a new one with a larger capital. The sum of \$110,000 was too small for such an enterprise, and we understand he intends to get up a London Co. with capital \$200,000, with new statutes which will permit the working of mines, and not limit him as at present to the mere refinement of ores. The latter is a most suitable reform, for at present there is a scarcity of extracted ore, and the works are ill supplied by the miners who are mostly too poor to work the treasures within reach. We believe Major Rickard works on his own account no fewer than fourteen veins of rich and abundant silver ore, the yield of which is sent in measures (cañones) of 5 tons English, by mules to the factory at Hilario. He is therefore quite an equal to the success of the enterprise when re-modelled, and offers to buy up the shares held in Buenos Ayres, or consolidate them with the proposed English Co. We do not see what ob-

jection can be offered to so just an alternative. New discoveries of rich ores are made daily, and all the stories of the mining riches of San Juan will soon be shown to fall far short of the brilliant reality.

The country is at present very quiet, and Gov. Sarmiento's departure does not seem to have caused any motive for disorder. The new Governor and ex-shareholders entertain the best wishes for Mr. Rickard, who is chief magistrate of the district, and having a strong guard of his riflemen at the works, keeps the neighborhood in happy security. Since the conspiracy to murder him and sack the works, luckily discovered in time, there has been no symptom of disorder, although in truth his breach-loaders have served to instil a salutary terror.

The Messrs Dillon were most kindly received by Major Rickard who procured them quarters with the officers and invited them to dine with His Excellency the Governor, besides many other attentions. They were not however so lucky as the Messrs. Klappenberg, the former not knowing the language or modus operandi and finding themselves perfectly useless in a strange country. Their letter of introduction to Major Rickard, as we anticipated, could procure them a cordial welcome, but not a livelihood, and we hope in future our countrymen on such occasions will be guided by our advice.

Respecting Mr. Rickard's new project we have to make a few observations. It is usual for a man who has so rapidly advanced himself to an important position by his personal talents, to meet with envious critics; and there are some who grumble about his recent step, while many censure him as bombastic and overweening. We do not profess to become his champion, but we have a great regard for the San Juan mines.

No one can deny that (as Mr. Wheelwright says), he is possessed of rare talents in his profession, and that the Mines of San Juan and the present enterprise are extraordinarily indebted to his indefatigable efforts. It remains with the shareholders to judge his proceedings, but surely his susceptibility to human vanity is small cause for complaint. Some of the particulars above stated we have learned from him, some from other reliable sources, and we have deemed fit to enter at full into a subject fraught with such importance to many of our readers and to the Argentine Republic.

GREAT NEWS FOR THE CAMP.

Gov. Saavedra and St. Patrick. Our friends, fellow-countrymen and lovers will learn with undisguised pleasure that his Excellency, Don Mariano Saavedra, the Governor of this Province, is at last beginning to prove himself half an Irishman, or in other words a chip of the old block.

The railway being now extended to the Villa Luxan, the governor considered it a necessary convenience that a station should be opened half way between Moreno and Luxan. After a lengthy correspondence with the engineers of the road, the government has at last succeeded in extracting from this Teutonic official a proper locality for such a station. The new station will be almost midway between Moreno and Luxan, and will be distant 54,600 metres from the Paryuo station, and will be almost in front of the town of Pilar which will be about 14 kilometers distant.

The locality of the new station has, we believe, been well selected, on a slight eminence and surrounded by the most fertile soil.

The name of the new town which is to be built at this station smacks little of Republicanism, and we regret that so gifted a historian as M. Dominguez could select no better appellation for the embryo town than that of some Argentine general whose fame and reputation is contemptibly local.

"General Rodriguez" is to be the appellation of the new town. Our readers of course will hardly credit that such should be the exquisite bad taste of the governor, but nevertheless it is the fact, and as we are led to believe that Argentines now take the lead of all creation we have no doubt that the next new town which will be created in Ireland will be yecept "Corporal Casey."

Still we cannot withhold praise for the liberality of the government in endowing the place with two schools and a church, particularly so when His Excellency the Governor, in compliment to Irishmen, who have done so much for the camp, has thought proper to command that the new church should be called St. Patrick's.

It is perfectly immaterial to us whether M. Saavedra is a Crudo or a Cocido, he has paid a compliment to our fellow countrymen and we appreciate it. Yesterday we published a letter which certified that he was the principal

instrument in effecting peace amongst the factions—to-day we certify to his anxiety to advance the country in building new towns and erecting temples of worship to the Almighty. We take sides, therefore, with the Governor, and demand for him a fair and impartial judgment.

We have no doubt if he had ministers who, instead of intruding their opinions, would faithfully execute his orders, many of the necessary reforms in the camp, which we daily allude to, would be brought about.

The new town we understand will be built partly upon the lands of Donna Manuela Maison and partly on small pieces of government land.

It must be borne in mind that a church in such a local place as the new station, will be of the greatest convenience to the neighbors. The schools also, if properly managed, will be of great service. No matter what people may say of the Governor, we insist the man is doing his best, and deserves every support, particularly from Irishmen resident in the camp.

There are many useful reforms necessary in the camp, and we firmly believe that if some of our subscribers would call His Excellency's attention to the matter, he would at once introduce measures of reform.

We protest, however, against christening the new town General Rodriguez, and hope that some other name will be selected. Suppose we call it the same as the church—San Patrick.

EDITOR'S TABLE.

Nothing particularly new occurred in town yesterday—the gentlemen are all preparing for the holidays, the ladies for the ball, which we hear will be on the most magnificent style. The 'paterfamilias' complain of the monstrous expense, but the shop-keepers say that there are fewer balls given in Buenos Ayres than in any other city of the world.

M. Lucio Mansilla's drama, "Atar Gull," came off last night, and we believe was very well received. We salute the Argentine Shakespeare, but would beg to remind him that he has omitted to send us either a copy of the drama or a box in the theatre. We are therefore obliged to form our judgment of the drama on hearsay evidence.

We perceive in the Reforma Pacifica that an unknown barque 194 days out from England had arrived in Montevideo, and passed on to Buenos Ayres.

The Mersey will leave on Friday for Montevideo; passengers are notified to be on board before four o'clock p.m. on that day.

M. Balcarce has by latest advices arrived in London, and presented his credentials as Argentine Minister Plenipotentiary to the Court of St. James.

Our colleague the 'Nacion Argentina' in speaking of the new telegraphic wires arrived for Paraguay, asks what use are such things in Paraguay. We advise the talented editor of this popular journal to make a trip this winter to Paraguay, when he will form a more correct opinion of that go-ahead country, about which he seems to be most profoundly ignorant. We could wish sincerely to see as many tramways intersect Buenos Ayres as we witnessed in Assencion.

Highway robberies are now becoming as frequent in this city as garrotting was in London last year. We read in the 'Nacional' that a distinguished broker was stopped in the streets in broad daylight, and a bag containing fifteen ounces, wrenched from him. Thanks, however, to the stentorian appeals of the victimized broker, the whole neighborhood started in pursuit of the thief, and Commissary O'Gorman pinned the fellow at the corner of Calle Saipacha, and made him return the lost specie. The highwayman, on being questioned, stated that he regarded the ounce brokers as the bone and sinew of the country, and considered it his duty to attack each and every one of them when occasion offered.

A rather laughable incident occurred the other night in Calle Florida, to one of our English clerks, who was returning home humming.

"Of in the stilly night," When a fellow came up on him, and insinuated the propriety of his immediately shutting up, or if he wanted to sing, to shout out 'down with the Cocidos.' Our friend, who was of the right stamp, agreed, but told the fellow he could only sing in English, and thereupon struck up an impromptu, to the tune of 'Molly Bawn,' cursing and d—g the Crudos and Cocidos in the most extravagant style. His companion was so charmed at the exquisite melody, that he invited the musical clerk to take a bottle of champagne with him at the cafe, where they regaled themselves, and parted the very best friends.

We are happy to learn that the shipment of jerked beef to England, which we noticed some time ago, have proved good speculations. It appears that the beef preserved in Salmuera has not met with similar success.

There is the greatest anxiety at present, amongst all parties, to invest in provincial lands. This is a beginning of what Mr. Wheelwright's enterprise will ultimately effect. Our office is crowded with applicants, but as we have not a land agency office, we refer them to the land brokers.

We are happy to assure our readers, that one of the lost pilots, Mr. M'Dermott, has at last turned up. It appears that Mr. M'Dermott was, instead of floating about the river, shooting quails at Maldonado.

A farmer from S.ito informs us, that in that district the camps have been suffering from want of rain. The last rain, however, visited the dried up camps of Salto, and the grass is coming up well. The farmers are again in good spirits.

At the meeting of the Club del Pueblo on Wednesday night there were over 2,000 people present. General Emilio Mitre, Dr. Gutierrez, and others, spoke in favour of the arrangement with the Club Libertad. Dr. Chassaing, however, opposed it vehemently, and unfortunately he seemed to possess the majority. The meeting was suspended with almost an equal division, without coming to any resolution.

In spite of Dr. Chassaing we are very well pleased to be able to state that the peaceful arrangement will be effected and that we shall have no disgraceful rioting, 'malgre' the speeches, for the two governments and the great majority of both clubs will support it.

We hear, by the 'Kepler,' that the experiments made in England with the traction engines, for Buenos Ayres, have given very satisfactory results and that they may be expected by the first Liverpool steamer. Several photographs have been sent out by the contractors. We suppose we shall receive one in a day or two.

Several camp excursions are projected for the May holidays, which it is thought will last from Sunday 22nd to Thursday 26th, both inclusive. This is not, however, likely. The 23rd May used to be a holiday in celebration of the "sweating the Constitution," but of late years the feast is forgotten, and if even the Governor declare 'feriado' in honor of the Western railway prolongation, this will only have effect outside the city. Thursday will not be a holiday, the feast of Corpus Christi having been postponed to the 9th of July.

The news of Flores is uninteresting, except that the rebels evacuated Tucumán, and took to the sierras. We regret to find the leader of the plot to seize the Government steamer, Artigas (né Pulaski), was an Englishman, one Robert Robinson; he was released on bail, but has been again arrested.

The 'Pueblo' states that the Cocido Club has rejected, by 1600 votes to 100, the proposed arrangement between the factions. Nevertheless, we fancy the only alarming result will be an increase of popularity for Dr. Chassaing, which will ultimately lead the rash young man to unpleasant consequences.

THE PIANOFORTE RECITAL.

Mrs. Curtis gave her musical soiree on Tuesday evening, at M. Guion's, before a select company, with the most signal success. English music is always a treat 7000 miles from home, but especially when ably rendered, as in the present case, by a gifted countrywoman. The execution of Beethoven's Sonata was so brilliant as to merit the warm approval of several German pianists who were present, but we confess our preference for vocal pieces, and the trio 'Taci infelice cuore' was beautifully sung, Messrs. Curtis and Marshall aiding the fair artist, who moreover played the accompaniment with great taste. 'Bella siccome un angelo,' by Mr. Curtis, was much applauded, as were also the 'Adeleide,' so general a favorite, and a Fantasia on the Pianoforte. Mrs. Curtis departed from her programme to give the charming English ballad 'If he be dearest,' and we have no doubt if Sims Reeves were present he would be jealous of the very happy rendering of his song. The 'Standard bearer' was no doubt a compliment to the company, who were all subscribers to this paper, but so this as it may the song exactly suits Mr. Curtis's voice, being given with all the clear and vigour characteristic of its title. 'Dungeo is son' from the Barber of Seville was exceedingly gracioso, and Mrs. Curtis reminded us of Mollo as Rosina; this was we think the best piece of all, and the performance closed with a German pianoforte lesson.

The company was about fifty in number, mostly English and French families, all of whom were really pleased with the entertainment, which lasted about an hour. We augur for Mrs. Curtis signal success in her profession as musical teacher in Buenos Ayres. She is a most accomplished pianist and

unites great taste with a highly melodious voice. Her talents shone more conspicuously, as the instrument was one of Erard's best pianos, and we warmly congratulate our countrywoman on her happy introduction to our Anglo-Argentine public.

ENGLISH HEROISM.

A POOR NATIVE SAVED.

We had occasion to call our readers' attention to the heroic conduct of an English clerk in Belgrano some few weeks ago. It is now our pleasing duty to publish the particulars of even a more meritorious affair, perpetrated by a Londoner recently arrived.

On last Sunday night, the English gentleman in question was coming up Calle Defensa, when almost in front of Lazama's quinta he heard a scuffle, and cries from some 'unfortunate human being, who was apparently struggling with an assassin.

Our countryman, true to his nationality, instead of proceeding on his way, hurried to the assistance of the distressed man. What was his horror to find a villain dressed in poncho and chiripa, with knife in hand, ready to murder an unfortunate man, who was prostrate on the ground. The heroic Englishman instantly grasped the murderous gaucho by the hair of the head, pulled him off the fallen man, but unfortunately in the scuffle the villainous gaucho succeeded in stabbing the intrepid Londoner in the calf of the leg. Notwithstanding his wound, and thirsting for revenge, Mr. T. succeeded in liberating himself from the clutches of the gaucho, and pitching into him in a style, only to be imagined by professional prizefighters, until the fellow's eyes got scientifically closed up: he kicked him until he damaged his own boots irretrievably, and then, with the assistance of the rescued native, tied the villain's arms, pulled off one of his boots, poked it down the fellow's throat, and then threw him into a ditch. We regret to say that the Englishman suffered, however, rather severely from his wound.

Our heroic countryman is son-in-law of a well known gunsmith, and merits the thanks and esteem of all his fellow-citizens for his unprecedented heroism and intrepidity.

THE GREAT SHEEP-STEALING CASE.

There has been a prosecution for sheep-stealing going on for some time back in our courts against two men named Agustín Gomez and José Berges. Gomez was a rather well-to-do native who lived in Magdalena, and Berges was a sort of medianero of his.

It appears that some time last year a number of sheep were missing out of the neighbours' flocks, and people could not find out what had become of them. An Irishman, however, who was passing by, one day, where Gomez's flock was, remarked a number of sheep in the flock with blood on the ears, and apparently recently sefaled—he of course spoke of the matter, although he himself had lost no sheep. The thing got to be talked of, and ultimately Gomez's medianero admitted to some of the native neighbours that there were several hundred sheep in his flock 'counter sefaled,' and that these sheep belonged to the neighbours.

Gomez when he heard that the justice of the peace was coming with the soldiers immediately skedaddled, and has not since returned.

The flock was embargoed, the mediauro sent into town to prison, and a criminal suit commenced, which was decided only last Monday.

Judge Langenheime, the criminal judge here in town, tried the case, and after hearing all the evidence, acquitted Berges of all complicity in the robbery, sentenced Gomez (when caught) to four years imprisonment with hard labour, and ordered the justice of the peace of Magdalena to take the embargo off the flock, return the stolen sheep to the owners, if found, and all the rest to be sold at public auction, to defray the expenses of minding them during the trial, and the balance to be handed over to the municipality.

We have no doubt that this will prove a salutary lesson to such thieving natives as live by robbing their neighbours. The counter sefaled system has been carried on a little too long, and Judge Langenheime deserves our warmest thanks for at last trying to stop it.

MR. WELLS'S BALLOONS.

The public is not aware of the great preparations being made by the American aeronaut for his ascent during the May festivals. We visited yesterday his two workshops, in which the great balloons Washington and Buenos Ayres are

being constructed. The first was some time ago exhibited in Plaza Parque and is now varnished and re-modelled, being almost completed and ready for use: in the topmost story of Colon theatre, there are three men at work the balloon covering the whole room and the wicker-work being capable of holding two persons. The net is composed of very strong cord, the material Irish linen, and the dimensions of the Washington 60 feet high, by 45 in diameter, with a superficies of 35,000 cubic feet, and made of 64 pieces strongly sewed together. This balloon will be inflated on the Gondolier principle, with rarefied air, for which purpose Mr. Wells will construct a small furnace and chimney in the Plaza Victoria, whence he will make his ascent. It will be remembered that a Frenchman, some years ago, attempted the same, but failed owing to the want of experience, and broke his leg, after going up 100 yards. Mr. Wells says his balloon was too small, and that accidents are often apt to occur in such experiments.

To guard against any fortuitous mishap, Mr. Wells is making the 'Buenos Ayres' after another method. This gigantic aerial vehicle is composed of 100,000 cubic feet, containing 1300 yards Irish linen, and will be inflated with gas. It is being sewed by Don Jose B. de Varela, of the Plaza Mayo, who with his family keeps three powerful sewing machines at work day and night. The stitching is a model of neatness and strength, and in a few days the balloon will be finished.

Mr. Wells in his first ascent will have a young man for his companion, but we believe the young lady has refused to go up during the May festivals. He purposes using the Recoba arch for his tackling, although he prefers the Cabildo tower, but the Municipality would probably dread his taking up the clock in nubibus.

THE INDIANS.

We copy the following from the 'Nacion Argentina':— CAMPAMENTO, Tres Arroyos, 17th April 1864.

To the Juez de Paz of the Partido of Indel: The undersigned begs to advise you that on the night of the 13th inst. he learned that the Indians were within seven leagues of this encampment, and he at once made preparations for marching. He started at daybreak and at about a league from the camp he found the Indians assembled, having in their possession some 18,000 to 20,000 head of cattle. He advanced towards them at the double-quick, with the intention of surprising the outposts and preventing any cattle being carried off, which he succeeded in doing.

This was the extent of his day's work. The Indians amounted to some 600—they lost two killed and several wounded, whom they carried off. The troops lost three wounded and one man taken prisoner, who has not since been heard of. This forced march has somewhat spoiled the horses, and he had to leave many of them on the road on account of their being tired, and he requests that you will send him, with all speed, some government horses, or horses of some marks not known in this partido. Want of time must account for the shortness of this despatch.

GREAT RACE AT SAN VICENTE.

On last Sunday one of the most exciting races ever known to have occurred in this quiet little village took place between a horse owned by a foreign merchant, who although not an Irishman lives in front of one of the largest Irish stores in this city, in Cudlo Piedad, and an Argentine horse, name unknown. As a matter of course the English merchant's horse won easily, and our friend pocketed all the spare San Vicente paper dollars available. The race was hardly deserving of the name, as the native horse hung behind in the most disreputable manner. It will be a long time before the San Vicentians will again challenge any horse belonging to an English merchant.

Great Rejoicing in Rosario.

Murrah for the Central Railway. The Paven was bearer of the glorious news from Mr. Wheelwright, and Capt. Bruce arrived at Rosario on Monday morning, his vessel hung with flags, and the band of the 7th battalion playing joyful tunes. At once the citizens flocked down to the beach and then gave themselves up to the most extravagant rejoicing. Capt. Espinosa with the band headed the procession, in which our friend Mr. Bruce was the hero, and a round of visits was paid to the Gefatura, Municipality, 'Ferro-carri' office, and other places. The Gefo ordered the day to be kept as a holiday, in celebration of the splendid announcement, and Rosario was a scene of universal merriment and congratulation. The townsfolk even begged that Captain Espinosa should be promoted, and we have no doubt that if Capt. Bruce were in the service they would at once make him an Admiral, on the field of action.

CONCORDIA

May 14th. The Indian, Cristo, with all his gang, had arrived at Concordia; some say that he had been kicked out of Salto, others, that tired of living on midshipman's pay, he has requested leave to retire from the neighbouring Republic.

Last night Salto was in a state of public rejoicing, on account of the town being freed from the Indians.

It is reported that Waldino Urquiza's troops are without money or food, and on that account are not likely to remain faithful to the Government much longer. The masherqueros are again appearing in Concordia, meeting at the house of a well-known villain.

A great many chiefs, officers, and Government employees, who have lost their bills, meet there. Their mild creed is, that it is necessary to wipe out Buenos Ayres, so that the Portenos should never lift their heads again.

'Delenda est Carthago,' has been preached of more cities than the Punic Capital. We have even heard that very classical quotation applied, many years ago, to 'perdido Albion,' but as, by last steamer, we heard of London being still under the mild sway of the Lord Mayor, let us hope that the heroic city of Buenos Ayres has still some few years of peaceful happiness in store for her, in spite of all the gas expended against her in the flourishing town of Concordia.

LOCAL EVENTS

ONE MORE UNFORTUNATE GONE TO HIS REST.—The 'Pueblo' states that on Sunday night last a person of the name of Don Juan Almiró was murdered near the Huaco de Cabecitas and adds the mournful remark, "We do not know whether the perpetrator of this foul crime has been arrested or not." When shall we be able to write, "the murderers were captured, tried next day and hanged the day after?" Shakespeare says that "hanging is the worst use that a man can be put to." Lord Monboddo, a well known Scotch judge held a different opinion, for he said that "a little hanging would do a man no harm." The latter authority evidently intended his remark to apply to nations, and here, in South America, we see the sad results of his opinions not being carried out.

Maritime Intelligence.—The Swedish barque 'Bloomer' reports having spoken, on 24th April, the British barque 'Chelgrove,' in latitude 1 deg. 26 min. S., longitude 27 deg. W., bound from Liverpool to California, 37 days out. The following vessels have arrived in Rio de Janeiro. May 6, British barque Fear Not from Montevideo, Brazilian brigantine Brazil from Montevideo.

Current Coin.—The 'Nacional' says, that on Saturday last, one of the light-fingered made a pounce upon a bag of ounces, which a man was carrying in Calle Suipacha, and took to his heels, evidently thinking, like Adam Smith, "that money was made to circulate." He was pursued by some policemen, and captured in Calle Cordova. This took place in broad daylight, at 2 p.m. Cash collectors will, at this rate, have to follow the example of bankers' clerks in London, and carry their bills and money attached by an iron chain to their waists.

Naval.—On Monday last the Brazilian war steamer Niteroy, having on board Admiral Baron de Tamandare, arrived at Montevideo, from Rio de Janeiro. The French war steamer, Lutetia, also arrived on the same day from Rio. Talking of naval matters, can any one tell us if the officers of the Forte intend giving a theatrical performance in the Colon Theatre, before bidding us a long farewell? It would be a most graceful way of saying 'adiou' to the Portenos.

The French Buffs.—To-night the Parisian Buffs inaugurate their new theatre. It is situated in Calle Reconquista, in front of the Merced Church, and is named the 'Franco-Argentino.' We have not seen the new building, but understand that it is very tastefully got up. We wish our French friends every success, and hope that they will have larger audiences than usually attend the Italian Opera.

Letter Found.—Some short time ago we advertised that a letter, addressed to Messrs. J. Blandfield and Co., had been found in the street, and was lying at our office. No one has thought fit to own it, and we again call attention to it. We are in painful ignorance as to its contents, but there is a feeling about it as though there were depreciated paper dollars inside. The owner may have it by proving his property, and in case no one coming forward to claim it, it will be sent by the English mail to its destination, unpaid.

The Pavon arrived to day, but brought no very particular news from the provinces; everything, we believe, is quiet.

The subscribers to the stock of the Argentine Central Railway Company in the River Plate are requested to pay up the first call. Mr. Wheelwright, it appears, was obliged to advance, out of his own pocket, £25,000 for the River Plate stockholders.

We call attention to the news we publish, respecting the San Juan Mines. Shareholders in this apparently questionable enterprise, will find it important. We hear of no freights, as ships are said to be scarce.
