EDITOR'S TABLE.

The city is again plunged in mud. Yesterday it was impossible for ladies to walk in the streets. The project for cleaning the sidewalks, which was sent in to the Municipality, has been thrown out, the Committee reporting that so long as the female citizens use inirriques, no such project is necessary.

On Sunday there was another meeting of the Circulo Literario, and a rather stormy discussion ensued as to the duties of the porter, and the right of members to send him with messages. Mr. Varola, of the 'Tribuna,' and Mr. Williams, of the 'River Plate Magazine,' attended and offered some suggestions. We hear that Mr. Rom, of the Bolsa, will give some lectures on political economy.

The news from Montevideo is that Flores and Moreno have at last had a fight—neither party beaten—Flores ran away, at least so the Montevidean papers say. No killed or wounded. President Aguirre had at last returned to Montevideo, and the belief is that terms will be finally concluded.

We regret to record the murder of another milkman, in the Plaza Once de Setiembre. The murdered man had only 30 dollars about him, of which he was robbed. The assassin, as usual, got away.

A gentleman returning from the opera last Friday night had a very narrow escape from the knife of some drunken villain in Calle Artes. The police are getting worse and worse each day.

The new station which the Western Railway is building in the Plaza Once de Setiembre will be the most splendid thing in town. It will occupy a whole square and will be finished on English style. This station will be the head office of the Company. A splendid new car has come out for the use of the President and Government. It will be put on the line on opening of the road to Mercedes. The road will shortly be finished to Mercedes, as the rails are being laid and the earthworks finished, but the people in Mercedes have not the remotest idea where the station is to be, and indeed the greatest speculation is going on as to the future site.

A new English café or restaurant has been opened in Calle Piedad, No. 117. The proprietor solicits English patronage.

Two little children were lost on Saturday, one a boy about four years, Vicente, the other a girl, Maria, aged six years. Any of our readers knowing anything about these children, will please notify the parents at 108, Suipacha.

The Chamber of Deputies, we hear has abolished flogging in the army. We hope that all the good which has been prophesied by the friends of this measure, will be realized; but we regret sincerely to say, that the moral condition of the Argentine army is not such as to justify any great leniency towards the soldiers.

Mr. Lanuz has published another important letter on the subject of the paper dollar. He comes out in his usual strong way. We will publish it to-morrow.

The steamer from the Uruguay arrived, but brought no news of importance. In Entre Rios everything was quiet, and on the Oriental shore the rebels had all left that district.

We are requested to direct the attention of the Committee of the 'Bolsa' to the disgraceful state of the Water-closets. A reform is urgently required, and certainly no credit can be given to the architects for such a miserable production.

THE CALVETE LIBEL.

This seems to be but one opinion respecting the disgraceful letter of Major Calvete. Indeed, it is difficult to imagine how the editor in question could forget the dignity of the press, and to allow the publication of such threats as 'to horse-whip the crooked eyed senator,' especially since the editor of the 'Pueblo' is a brother-member of Congress with the aggrieved party.

The matter has caused considerable noise, and occupied the attention of the National Senate for some time. It is not yet concluded, and our legislators are diverted from more serious subjects, to decide a question of punctilio. The debate on Saturday brought out some brilliant orations from the Prime Minister and Senator Frias, the former declaring that the offence in question came under no law or tribunal in the land, and the latter rightly insisting on some method of punishment.

In our idea nothing is simpler than for President Mitre to cashier the military bully, without any foolish formalities; or for Congress to summon him to the bar of the House, and condemn him to make an apology on his knees or go to prison till the close of the session. In England it would not take so many minutes, as it does here weeks, to settle the matter. The Committee of the Senate, however, thought fit to throw out the bill for Calvete's accusation, and when we remember that the Senator aggrieved is proprietor of a paper (El Nacional) which has been at times very scurrilous it is easy to understand why Sr. Piñero finds little sympathy.

Nevertheless, the dignity of Congress should be vindicated, irrespective of Sr. Piñero and his antecedents. The Ministers plead 'the liberty of the Press,' forgetting that Sr. Calvete and the 'Pueblo' newspaper have inflicted a serious injury on our prerogative, and that our real interests demand a severe chastisement for such an outrage on public decency.

NEWS FROM PERU.

The couriers have at length succeeded in crossing the Andes, and the last mail brings dates from Valparaiso up to June 25th, with news from Peru three weeks later than via England. The Peruvians, after their patriotic attempts to poison the Spanish Minister on board the packet, and assassinate him at Panama, anticipated the vengeance of Admiral Pinzon, and Callao was in a state of great alarm. The Government of Peru has not made the least step towards grappling with the invaders, and the only warlike symptom is the arrival of 100 Chilean volunteers at Callao. Most absurd stories are circulated about Pinzon's forces being attacked with scurvy, and their not knowing the use of rifles. The Spanish vessels find no difficulty in procuring provisions all along the west coast, and although their crews at present hardly make 1,000 men, the Peruvians take good care not to come within cannon-shot.

The Government of Ecuador refuses all complicity with the heroes of Talambó, but offers its friendly offices to intercede with the offended Spanish nation. In Bolivia all the National Guards have been called out for active service, it is not clear however whether to redeem the guano mounds of Peru or to declare war with Chile for those of Mejillones. The republic of Chile is the only one determined to make common cause with Peru, but if there be any intention to fight the Spaniards, 100 volunteers will be a poor assistance.

The French Consul at Panama has written to the Governor, accusing him and the police authorities of complicity in the affair of 25 negroes hired to murder Sr. Mazarredo, and threatening the vengeance of the Imperial Government for so flagrant a violation of all law and Christianity.

ROBBERIES AND OUTRAGES.

1. A Frenchman named Auguste Osou was robbed of his gold watch and chain on Thursday evening at Plaza Parque.

2. On Tuesday night some thieves contrived to carry off a tercio of yerba mate from a grocery at the corner of Temple and Corrientes.

3. Two foreigners (one of them a Frenchman), were coming from Bolgrano on Friday evening, when two natives attacked them, taking the Frenchman's watch. The latter, however, seized the robber and beat him severely, whereupon an English neighbor ran out of his house to see what was the matter. The native said "let me go, and I'll give you the watch." A crowd assembled, and the Frenchman, getting alarmed, ran off. The Englishman asked three 'teniente alcaldes' to seize the native, on whose person was found an iron bar, but they refused. At length one Pablo took him to the Commissary, who at once ordered both robbers to be liberated.

4. A tinsmith was attacked, last week, after dark, near Isola de Oro, by two men, but he floored them with some opportune brick-bats, and escaped.

5. We learn that an Irishman recently shot a native in a quarrel at a

pulperia near Fortin de Arco. The native is not dead; the other has abandoned his sheep and 'cleared out.'

6. Saturnino Ortiguera, taken up for swindling, and going under a variety of aliases.

7. Two natives were taken up on Thursday for fighting with knives.

8. D. Santiago Calzadilla and his wife were attacked by some ruffians in a carriage, who struck them in the face with a stick: they were fortunately captured.

THEATRICAL OVATION.

MADAME BRIOL'S BENEFIT.

Our opera-house has never appeared to greater advantage than on Friday night. In spite of the weather, the house was very full, and the boxes presented quite a galaxy of beauty and fashion. Norma was well played and sung, and the applause and enthusiasm which followed every scene inspired Madame Briol with unprecedented talent and power. On former occasions she divided the palm with her charming rival Mollo, but now she bore it off undisputed. Yet the other prima donna could not have been excelled in Adalgisa, and the performance on the whole was one of the best witnessed for a long time. In fact some Englishmen recently arrived were quite surprised, no less at the brilliant spectacle of the audience, than the superior rendering of this fine opera.

After the first act Madame Briol sang the waltz said to be composed for her by Sig. Nannetti, but the singing was much superior to the composition, which was only a parody on the Baccio. It was, however, encored, and Signor Nannetti called on the stage to receive a public acknowledgment. After the third act, the fair artist came forward dressed as Manta, and sang 'The Last Rose of Summer' in English with such exquisite taste that it received an enthusiastic encore. Nevertheless we prefer her rendering of it in Italian, not from her foreign accent, but because Tuscan is really softer than English.

The ovation of Friday night was the grandest ever seen in Buenos Ayres, and much more practical than the noisy Peruvian meetings. Besides a number of handsome wreaths and bouquets, the following valuable presents were given to Mme. Priol.

JOINT PURCHASE OF LAND.

The letter in the 'Standard' of July 27th, signed 'Subscriber,' is sufficient evidence of the fact that many at present roving land would purchase if they knew or could find others to join in buying a tract with the intent of dividing it immediately afterwards. What could be easily accomplished by six or eight united would be an impossibility to one or two; if they not only joined to purchase, but to assist each other in the management of their establishments, they would, in a great measure, be independent of peons and would save many dollars often foolishly spent. The art is not in gaining or making the money—any fool can do that; the great secret is in knowing how to avoid spending what you have gained.

This want of union is guilty of many sins—among others, that of forcing many with two or three hundred thousand dollars in the bank, to remain tenants, thereby depriving themselves of many comforts that no estancia could be without. It seems to me that some one should have an interest in uniting or bringing into contact all those small capitalists. What say the land agents to this observation?

In the mean time farmers should bear in mind that there is now an opening in Santa Fé for those who are not determined to live forever subject to the whims of landlords, or spending their hard earnings in continued removals; let the opportunity pass and it may fly beyond your reach for ever. As the tracts for sale, with few exceptions, are too extensive to meet the individual wants of the great majority,

it would be advisable to buy jointly. To do this, intending purchasers require to be acquainted with each other's views, and, as all have not the privilege of being assisted by the editors of the 'Standard' in searching for persons anxious to purchase jointly—not because the editors would refuse any assistance in their power, but it would be unreasonable in, for instance, a non-subscriber to make such a request; and I am sorry to say there are many in a position to buy land who are not subscribers, which between ourselves and the wall, is, to say the least of it, a great shame—it becomes necessary that they should seek each other through the medium of advertisements, through the office of a land agent; or through mutual friends. In my opinion, the most efficient plan would be the following: a land agent having a tract, say five leagues, for sale, advertises that he can not sell it in fractions but will receive offers for any fraction of it with a view to finding a sufficient number to buy the tract; A, in answer to this advertisement, applies for two leagues, B, for one league, C, for half a league, and so on until the required number is complete, of which the agent informs the applicants; they then meet, buy the land conditionally, appoint one or two of the party to inspect it, each paying his proportional share of the expenses. When on the spot, if the land they went to see was not suitable, they could see other tracts of which they would, probably, get information in Rosario, from the society lately formed to promote immigration, of which Mr. Perkins is a member.

Land agents on their part should not forget that there are fifty small capitalists able to purchase and stock a small tract, against one able, and if able not willing, to purchase a large estancia; consequently the land agent with the object of keeping number one in view, should afford every facility possible to purchasers of small farms.

Me temper's rix when I think of it, and I'll be wanting holding, or maybe I'll be doing something I might be sorry for in the mornin when the sun, God bless her, gets up, though its movelf, and a good many more as enjoys ourselves bether after the daylight's over, and I'll leave it to the likes of you, gentlemen, to tell me why we feel a little ill-temper'd of a mornin whin the sun's rising; speaking as a Con-naughtman, I'll be on my oath its not the la-t four tumbler's as done it. But to return to the subject, or, as I am told, 'return to your mutton chop, and eat it while its hot,' and a very sensible idea that is for a Frinckman, or any other man; and I'd like to see the boy as would take me away from my hot chop, and I as hungry as a ghost that's wandering in thim Recolectors for many's the long year, and hasn't seen an assize since the day they were buried, or rather put on a shelf to dry and poison the neighbourhood with the smell in the process, of flaunting their rich silver, embossed, polished collars, to the gaze of a few strangers or visitors, who merely remark that it would be better to put that handful of earth back into the earth it came from; and, let us hope, that the living soul that once animated that now foul-smelling carcass, ostentatiously rotting before our eyes, let us hope that the soul, when it arrived in the presence of the Creator, received the command, 'thou hast done well on earth, according to the talent I gave thee, go forth on My right hand.' But, gentlemen, I'll not tell yees a word of lies, but it's as true as I'm here, that neither the gossosons or the omadhaun came nigh the place up to three o'clock, when I returned to town. Whether it was the materials over night, or the ill temper in the morning that kept them away, I don't know, but I'm sartin shure, that there was no living soul on the grounds of Palermo but myself and an ould washerwoman, who gave me a light for my cigar, and in return for her civility I helped her for half an hour to gather her cloathes off the orange trees, which a few short years ago it would have been almost sacrilege to touch, but now are things to hang dirty linen upon. I sat me down under a tree on the line, and a sort of dream came over me of the past history of Buenos Ayres, in connexion with the spot where I was then sitting. I dreamt of the things I have read and heard of about Palermo and Rosas; and I saw him also, as he now is, with the stamp of Cain on his brow, not daring to meet his fellow-man, much less his offended Creator.

Heroic conduct of an Irishwoman

Disgraceful Bigotry.

To the Editors of the 'Standard' Gentlemen,

A FOREIGNER.

Mr. George Hagen, a Danish subject, after many years residence in the city of Corrientes, died there about the beginning of the present year. In consequence of the Circular of the National Government of January 31st 1863 ordering that a space in each Cemetery be reserved for the interment of those foreigners who may die not professing the Roman Catholic faith, permission was solicited at the Police office for his burial in the Cemetery of the church at La Cruz; the necessary boleto was promptly given by the Police authorities and presented at the Cemetery. The Curate of La Cruz not only refused to allow the body to be interred there, but also refused to allow the public heave to be hired for its conveyance, so that a common street cart was necessarily used for that purpose. The body was subsequently interred by order of the Curate behind the Cemetery in a public street. A few friends of the deceased wished to place a railing round the grave, but in a public street it was not possible.

Progress of the war in America

The Etna brings two day's later news from America, but nothing has occurred that varies the position of General Grant's army, or at least no thing that can be rolled on with any confidence. There was a rumour, indeed, that General Grant was abandoning his recent position—as was supposed, for the purpose of crossing the James River and attacking Richmond from the south. But this report, though not altogether improbable in itself, is communicated in too vague a manner to entitle it to any great confidence at present. It is rather probable than otherwise that General Grant may be compelled to try an attack from the south if all other means should fail, but the attempt will be attended with great danger both to his army and to the city of Washington. That city will be laid open to attack by such a movement and we may therefore doubt whether it will be made until another attack has been made on General Lee's position on the north side of Richmond.

The accounts from the Shenandoah Valley appear to agree in stating that the Federal General Hunter has gained a considerable success over the Confederates, under General Jones, in the neighborhood of Staunton, but they differ as to the extent of the success. The future movements of the two armies can alone show the extent and importance of the Federal victory in that district. The time has gone, however, when the victory can produce any decisive result.

From Kentucky the accounts fully confirm the rumours of the Confederate General Morgan's forces in that State. He appears to hold most of the principal towns, has broken up all the railways, and even threatened Cincinnati, on the Ohio. The chief importance of these movements is in the effect which they have of endangering the communications of General Sherman with the Northern States.

We learn that the Confederates have got the command of the Mississippi between Vicksburg and Memphis by means of powerful batteries erected at Greenville, on the Mississippi bank of the river, and at Columbia, nearly opposite, on the Arkansas side. These batteries are said to have destroyed or captured four gunboats and seven transports. A fleet of gunboats had been sent to dislodge them, but up to the last accounts the Confederates still held their ground, and cut off all communication between the Federal forces on the upper part of the river and those on the lower. The Confederates had collected all their forces for a great battle in defence of Atlanta. Their position was at Marietta, in front of the river Chattahoochee, the principal river of that district. General Johnston's headquarters are at Marietta General Hardee the right, and General Polk the left. General Sherman was in the neighborhood of Aekworth, four or five miles distant from Johnston's headquarters.

Gold has been as high as 99 premium, but it had afterwards declined to 97. The export of specie continues, the Etna bringing \$1,223,836.

Determination of the Prussian Government

It will be seen by the accounts from Frankfurt that the Prussian Government has refused all the proposals of the English Government on the Danish question. It has refused the line of boundary proposed by England: it has refused the arbitration of one and all the Powers represented at the Conference; and it has refused to abide by the decision of any arbitrator, however appointed, unless his decision should be quite agreeable to itself. A more absolute, unconditional, and insistent refusal has certainly never been given or received. The only thing that Prussia does not refuse is an armistice: that she is willing to agree to for a period of two months, retaining possession of the territories of the King of Denmark during that period.

It is somewhat curious, however, while we are thus told what Prussia will do, not a word is said of what Austria will do. Yet this is quite as important, and we can only hope that this silence is a proof of a more reasonable temper on the part of Austria. That we shall know to-day, when the substance of the proceedings of the Conference must be made public.

Hampshire and Oxford Down Sheep

The correspondent in England of the French 'Journal Agriculture Pratique,' in a letter published after last season's shows of Fat Stock, expresses quite an enthusiastic opinion of these breeds. "They have perhaps less fineness," he says "than the South Downs, which will be always preferred by amateurs; but for the professional cultivator, who, above all other considerations, desires to have a profitable return, the Hampshire and Oxfordshire Downs are infinitely superior to the South Downs. In effect the return is much more considerable in a given time and with a given nourishment. These sheep are more developed; they are also precocious, and give a third more wool and meat, and as regards symmetry of form, no breed is superior to them, while the anchoration which these breeds have undergone during the last ten years has been continuous and happy. The breeds, for the rest, begin to obtain a footing in France. His Imperial Highness Prince Napoleon has been good enough to accept the recommendation which I have had the honor to make to him of some Oxford Downs, and I have lately forwarded to him a lot of lambs which leave in every respect absolutely nothing to be desired, and which, notwithstanding their greatly superior development, and compared with South Downs, can sustain a comparison, with this latter breed in the matter of symmetry and even of firmness."

The Ionian Intelligence.

His Excellency, M. Elizalde, Minister of Foreign Affairs, gave his first diplomatic dinner, for the season, at his private palace last evening. There was a full attendance of the Corps Diplomatique.

It is rumored that a full dress levee will be given when the streets are less muddy, at the Provincial Government House.

Mr. Parker has been duly installed a member of the Foreign Racing Society.

Yesterday there was a rumor about town that the Italian Consul had been shot in a duel at Palermo.

An affair of honor is talked of as likely to come off early next week between two military English gentlemen.

On dit, that the lovely daughter of a wealthy camp merchant will shortly be led to the Hymeneal altar by a well known foreign estanciero.

The 'Pueblo' mentions a Grand Fancy Ball which took place at the Austrian Consulate.

To-night is to come off an evening party at the residence of an English merchant, of the South end.

We are happy to say that Mr. Wheelwright is quite recovered, being no longer confined to his bed.

Two native capitalists are about to espouse two charming sisters, resident in the North end.

On Sunday evening the opera of Lucrezia was given instead of Ione, owing to Sr. Celestino's sudden illness.

The American Sanitary Benefit will come off on Friday, the opera will be Marta.

The soiree musicale of Mino Combarcos, with 20 hands and 6 pianos, promises to be a brilliant affair.

We have not heard who will give the next Lecture at the British Library.

The bazaar for the British Hospital is still in embryo, but a valuable stock of needle-work and fancy articles is ready.

The Circulo Litorario met on Sunday. We learn that the discussion of the rules was animated.

The Plata Club will shortly give a grand ball.

The Foreign A. Racing Club offers a Ladies prize for the next meeting.

Mr. Samuel R. Phibbs leaves by next packet for England.

The foot race reported in our last has been postponed, and will come off this week at Palermo.

Mr. Fair and the Central Railway

Some six months ago it was currently rumored that our worthy Consul in London had intrigued against the great Argentine Enterprise—the Cordoba railway.

It affords us the greatest satisfaction to see now duly authorized to contradict the disparaging statement.

Things were very dull on 'Change to-day. We don't suppose the brokers made in bona fide commissions ten dol.

Business is dull through town owing to the state of the streets; dull in the plazas owing to the mud on the roads.

The price is left in blank, but we believe is 2000 per league.

The emigrants shall be exempt from all military service, but permitted to form a corps fully equipped for their own defence.

Such is in brief the important scheme which has been ratified by the Govern or and Legislature.

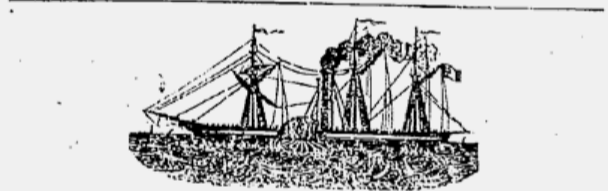
